<b>Allegheny Serviceberry 3g</b>	<i>Amelanchier laevis</i>	\$26	Late April - May	Part-sun	White flowers; can tolerate clay soil and black walnut	15-25' H 15'-25' W	Large flowers; excellent red fall color; purple fruits attract birds in summer
<b>Black Chokeberry 3g</b>	<i>Aronia melanocarpa</i>	\$26	May	Full Sun to Part-shade	Small clusters of white flowers in mid-spring; prefers moist to wet soil; dark green foliage turns deep red in fall; slow grower	5- 8' H 3-5' W	Fruit is eaten by birds in mid to late winter
<b>Buttonbush 5g</b>	<i>Cephalanthus occidentalis</i>	\$26	July - August	Full Sun to Part-shade	White flowers; prefers moist to wet soil; moderate growth rate	8' H 8' W	Nectar attracts butterflies (such as the tiger swallowtail) and hummingbirds. Attracts over 24 species of birds (including robin, kingbird and towhee). Nutlets persisting through winter attract birds
<b>Silky Dogwood 5g</b>	<i>Cornus amomum</i>	\$26	May to June	Full Sun to Part-shade	White, flat-topped flowers; moderate grower; prefers moist, well-drained soil; tolerant of clay; tolerant of black walnut; can be thicket forming	8' H & W	Fruit is loved by small birds and waterfowl
<b>Gray Dogwood 5g</b>	<i>Cornus racemosa</i>	\$26	May	Full Sun to Part-shade	White, flat-topped flowers; slow grower; tolerant of clay; tolerant of black walnut; can be thicket forming	8' H 6' W	White berries with red stems; prefers moist, well-drained soil
<b>American Hazelnut 3g</b>	<i>Corylus americana</i>	\$26	Early March to Mid-End of April	Full Sun	Brown male catkins	8' H	Nuts eaten by squirrels and chipmunks; browsed by deer
<b>Smooth Hydrangea 3g</b>	<i>Hydrangea arborescens</i>	\$26	July - September	Full Sun to Part-shade	Large, white, cloud shaped flowers; prefers moist, well-drained soil; fast grower; tolerant of black walnut	5' H & W	Flowers attract bees, butterflies, and other beneficial insects. Additionally, they provide shelter for birds and small mammals
<b>Black Tupelo (T) 5g</b>	<i>Nyssa sylvatica</i>	\$26		Full Sun to Part-sun	Prefers acid soil, moist, and well-drained; tolerates clay soil; slow grower; red leaves in fall	30-50' H 20-30' W	Attracts game birds, songbirds, cavity-nesting birds, and mammals
<b>American Hophornbeam (T) 3g</b>	<i>Ostrya virginiana</i>	\$26		Full Sun to Part-sun	Also known as Ironwood; is a tough, hardwood; resistant to many disease and insect problems; prefers moist well-drained soil; slow grower; tolerant of black walnut	25-40' H 15-40' W	Attracts small mammals and songbirds
<b>Common Ninebark 3g</b>	<i>Physocarpus opulifolius</i>	\$26	Late May to Late June	Full Sun	White flower clusters; red seed membranes are attractive in late summer; can tolerate clay soil and black	9' H	Good nectar and pollen source; dry seeds possibly eaten by game birds; twigs provide browse for deer; good cover for birds
<b>Smooth Sumac 5g</b>	<i>Rhus glabra</i>	\$26		Full Sun	Tolerant of dry, gravelly, and sandy soil; tolerant of black walnut; fast grower; more sun, better fall color	15' H	Female plants develop upright, scarlet-red, hairy fruits which persistent into winter

<b>American Black Currant 5g</b>	<i>Ribes americana</i>	\$26	Early Spring	Full Sun to Part-shade	Yellow; prefers moist soil; tolerant of black walnut	5' H 5' W	Edible black berries in mid-summer
<b>Early Wild Rose 3g</b>	<i>Rosa blanda</i>	\$26	April - May	Full Sun	Fragrant, pink flowers; prune after flowering; tolerates dry, Alkaline, and clay soils; suckering shrub; fast grower	4'- 5' H	Attracts bees and other pollinators; bright, red berry (rose hip)
<b>Prairie Rose 5g</b>	<i>Rosa carolina</i>	\$26	June - July	Full Sun to Part-sun	Pink, showy flowers; rosehips are attractive in fall	1- 4' H	Attracts pollinators; small mammals and game birds eat rosehips
<b>Swamp White Oak (T) 3g</b>	<i>Quercus bicolor</i>	\$26		Full Sun to Part-shade	Orange to gold fall color; tolerant of black walnut	60' H 50' W	Acorns attract migrant birds, small mammals, game birds, and game mammals
<b>Oak - Bur (T) 3g</b>	<i>Quercus macrocarpa</i>	\$26		Full Sun	Large leaves; round shape; good tree for urban sites; tolerant of clay soil	60' H 50' W	Large acorns attract birds and small mammals
<b>Jack Oak (T) 3g</b>	<i>Quercus jackiana</i>	\$26		Full Sun to Part-shade	Jack oak is a naturally occurring cross-breed of white oak and swamp white oak; prefers moist well-drained soil; tolerates clay	90' H	Acorns attract birds and small mammals
<b>Chinkapin Oak (T) 3g</b>	<i>Quercus muhlenbergii</i>	\$26		Full Sun	Slow - moderate grower; prefers moist, well-drained soil; one of the best oaks for alkaline soil; tolerant of dry sites & clay; prune when dormant	50-80' H 50-70' W	Attracts game birds, game mammals, migrant birds, and small mammals
<b>Oak - Red (T) 3g</b>	<i>Quercus rubra</i>	\$26		Full Sun to Part-shade	Prefers moist, well-drained soil; tolerant of clay and sandy soil; russet to bright red leaves in fall; tolerant of black walnut	60-75' H	Acorns attract birds and small mammals
<b>Black Elderberry 5g</b>	<i>Sambucus canadensis</i>	\$26	June and July	Full Sun to Part-shade	White, fragrant flowers; tolerant of clay soil and black walnut	8-15' H	Purple berries may be used for jam or in muffins
<b>American Bladdernut 3g</b>	<i>Staphylea trifolia</i>	\$26	April	Full Sun to Part-shade	Clusters of drooping, tubular white flowers in early spring; moderate to fast grower; can be thicket forming; prefers moist, drained, alkaline soil	8-15' H	Provides protection and habitat for birds and wildlife; flowers attract pollinators
